God Defend New Zealand is now generally the preferred anthem of Kiwis both at home and on the international stage. God Save The Queen tends to be reserved for formal ceremonies involving the Queen, the Governor-General or the Royal family or when referring to the Queen's role as New Zealand's head of state.

God of Nations at Thy feet, In the bonds of love we meet, Hear our voices, we entreat, God defend our free land. Guard Pacific's triple star, From the shafts of strife and war, Make her praises heard afar, God Defend New Zealand.

The words to God Defend New Zealand, five verses by Thomas Bracken, were first published in 1876 as part of a competition to compose a national air (tune or song) for New Zealand. The winning composer was Otago teacher John Joseph Woods.

Ine of the earliest recordings of the national anthem was made in 1928 by tenor Ernest McKinley at Columbia Records in Sydney. Listen to the recording http://digital1.natlib.govt.nz/20020604/cd48track21_00002345_df.mp3 and you'll hear the verse repeated in te reo Māori, less common at the time than it is today. McKinley was popular in both Australia and New Zealand during the late 1920s and 1930s.

God Save the Queen/King has been in continuous use since 1745 when it was first performed at the Theatre Royal, Drury Lane in London in support of King George II. The lyrics were a response to the defeat of the King's army by that of the 'Young Pretender' to the British Throne, Prince Charles Edward Stuart, at Prestonpans, near Edinburgh.
