His Majesty King Charles III, New Zealand's Sovereign, was crowned on Saturday 6 May 2023 in a ceremony at Westminster Abbey. Read on to learn more.

The Coronation of King Charles III and Queen Camilla took place on Saturday 6 May at Westminster Abbey in London.

Constitutionally, King Charles III became our head of State immediately following the death of his mother, Queen Elizabeth II, last year but the Coronation service was ceremonial recognition of this fact.

New Zealand was invited to send a delegation to the Coronation service. The delegation included Prime Minister Rt Hon Chris Hipkins, Governor-General Rt Hon Dame Cindy Kiro, the New Zealand High Commissioner to the United Kingdom Phil Goff, senior Royal Honours recipients, and ten additional representatives including Leader of the Opposition Christopher Luxon, Kiingi Tuheitia, and Willie Apiata VC. Prior to the Coronation ceremony, members of the delegation met with the King and his family during formal events Buckingham Palace.

King Charles III is our <u>Sovereign</u>, the <u>Head of State and source of all executive legal authority in New Zealand</u> (https://www.parliament.nz/en/visit-and-learn/history-and-buildings/special-topics/the-demise-of-the-crown/the-sovereign-s-role-in-new-zealand/). The Sovereign acts on the advice of the Government in all but the most exceptional circumstances. The Coronation was marked across Aotearoa in several ways, including the He Rā Rākau Titapu tree-planting campaign, the illumination of buildings and landmarks across New Zealand (including the Parliament Buildings) with purple light, gun salutes by the New Zealand Defence Force, and an art exhibition at the New Zealand Academy of Fine Arts.

The first tree planting of He Rā Rākau Tītapu – the King Charles III Coronation Plantings <u>happened on Parliament</u> <u>grounds on Wednesday 26 April</u>
